First Things First

When the wine ran out at a certain wedding held in Cana, Mary turned to her son and told him he needed to do something. "Why do you involve me? My hour has not yet come," replied Jesus (John 2: 4). Mary was having none of this and advised the servants to do as her son instructed. And with that nudge from his mother, Jesus performed his first miracle. His hour had come.

While Jesus was the reluctant miracle-maker at the wedding in Cana, he was much more intentional when it came to launching his public ministry: The Sermon on the Mount.

That Jesus chose the Beatitudes as his first Messianic message says so much about his priorities and with whom he chose to identify: The poor, the poor in spirit, those who mourn, the meek, those who hunger for righteousness, the merciful, the pure in heart, the peacemakers, and those persecuted in his name (Matthew 5: 1-10). SALEENA'S STORY: I'm so grateful for this place

A victim of domestic violence for almost five years. Saleena endured bouts of emotional and mental abuse from her husband. Most of the abuse was in the form of jealousy and his substance addiction. Then in front of their four kids he turned violent.

"Before coming to UGM, I wrongly thought that

domestic violence didn't include emotional and mental abuse," said Saleena. Often Domestic abuse starts as jealousy or threats, followed by apologizing and promising to change, but then the cycle happens again...and again. With Saleena it happened over and over until it turned horribly violent.

"I thought I was going to die that day," she says. "His addiction got worse and worse and I tried to hold on for the kids, but soon I realized I needed to

leave for the kids and myself." Saleena's church family and pastor guided her to call the Union Gospel Mission. Continued inside... "I know now what love truly is."—SALEENA

"I've never had a substance addiction, why should I go to a recovery program, I thought to myself. But in the middle of the night while I was crying myself to sleep, in a tent on the streets, with my four children by my feet because I had nowhere else to go...I said okay, I'll give it a try. Coming to UGM's LifeChange for Women and Their Children was an instant relief. They didn't judge me, they encouraged me.

"Being able to get counseling and go to recovery classes is huge to me. I'm healing not only from the abusive relationship, but from childhood hurts. I'm learning what domestic abuse and codependency is. I'm getting a lot closer with my kids, they are learning how to express their feelings in a healthy way. They know that they don't need to be scared here."

Saleena is hopeful for her future now for the first time in a long while.

"I'm looking forward to healing and being confident and healthy," she says. "I know that I'm loved here, I know now what love truly is, not like in the past. I feel loved here, not just hearing it, but feeling what love truly is, and my kids feel it too. I'm truly grateful for God leading me to this place."

UGM's LifeChange is a Christ-centered recovery program where residents live and work in a community of people committed to transforming their lives and breaking the grip of addiction. LifeChange consists of counseling, work therapy, discipleship, and transitional after care, at no cost to the resident

The Journey Home Campaign was launched in January 2021 to build a new center for homeless women and children in our community. Over the past 15 months we've remained on schedule to break ground this summer. As we anticipate this vision becoming a reality, here are a few quick facts about the new facility:

- Total Square Footage: 50,500
- Location: NW 185th and Rock Creek
- **Rooms:** 52 (110% increase from our current facility)
- **Impact:** 2,000 women and children over the next decade
- Transformational Spaces for Women and Children: Chapel, Learning Center, Counseling Center, Quiet Rooms, Community Spaces, Kitchen and Dining, Children's Education Center, State-of-the-Art Playground
- **Groundbreaking:** June 2022
